Committees are responsible for investing National Lottery Players' money in projects ranging from £100,000 to £2million.

The East of England committee is one of 12 across the UK, and each meet four times a year. Chairs and members are normally appointed for three years in the first instance with the potential for a second term.

HLF funding in the East of England has supported a vast array of projects over the past 21 years, investing almost £440million in more than 3,600 projects. Recent highlights involving the the East of England committee include the:

- Refurbishment historic town centres in Bedford and Wisbech
- Restoration of Cedars Park in Broxbourne
- Project that shares the stories within Essex Record Office's sound archives;
- Acquisition of land to complete the protection of Norfolk's best known nature reserve at Cley Marshes and to expand its learning space
- Myriad of First World War commemoration projects across the East of England
