New funding for community environment projects in Wales

Applications now open for The National Lottery Heritage Fund and Welsh Government's new grant programmes helping communities to look after the natural world.

The one-year programmes, worth over £4million, will enable local communities across Wales to get involved with restoring and enhancing nature including woodlands.

Local Places for Nature

The Local Places for Nature Capital Grant for Wales scheme supports projects designed and led by community groups and organisations to create, restore and enhance habitats in Wales.

Applications are open now and grants range between £10,000 and £100,000. The total available funding is £2.3million (updated 11 September 2020).

Activities could include:

- increasing community orchards, community growing and allotments
- planting street trees
- minimising the use of pesticides, fertilisers and peat-based compost
- changing land use to promote nature and reduce flooding

increasing access to safe drinking water

Community Woodlands

The Community Woodlands scheme will see people getting involved in creating a National Forest for Wales, bringing together linked-up woodlands and hedgerows. Communities will be able to use the funding for projects which restore, create, connect and manage woodlands in Wales.

Applications are open now until **21 October 2021** and the scheme will run until March 2022. Grants will range between £10,000 and £250,000. The total funding pot available is worth £2.1m.
