In our [Heritage 2033 strategy](#) we identified places of worship as heritage in need, affected by changes in the sector and gaps in support. We're committed to helping them address the challenges they face and ensuring they are resilient community assets for generations to come, through a variety of approaches. Any place of

worship in the UK can apply for National Lottery Heritage Grants funding.

Dedicated funding to tackle common issues at scale

Introduced in July, our Heritage in Need: Places of Worship strategic initiative will invest £15million to support large projects that address widespread needs and challenges. Through this, we want to make heritage in this sector more sustainable and secure.

We invite organisations across the UK who know places of worship best to devise and deliver strategic projects at a national and regional level. We want to support projects focusing on sustainability and accelerating new ideas and interventions.

Conservation grants boost

Our first award through this strategic initiative is £4.68m to expand the Church of England's Conservation Grants Scheme. Our support will help fund building repairs, preserve church interiors and train a new generation of heritage craft specialists over the next five years.

Emily Gee at Church of England said: "We are hugely grateful to the Heritage Fund for this extraordinarily generous and much-needed award for church buildings.

"It will enable us to expand our support to parishes in their crucial work to preserve our treasured cultural heritage, including the conservation of stained glass, wall paintings, clocks, bells, paintings and monuments."

Apply for National Lottery Heritage Grants

Any place of worship in the UK, of any religion or denomination, can apply for grants from £10,000 to £10m.

Our goal is to help those who care for places of worship improve their condition and equip the sector with the shared expertise, people and skills needed to care for this heritage into the future. We also want places of worship to achieve their potential as hubs for community activity and celebrating heritage. We anticipate awarding grants worth around £85m to support this ambition over the next three years.
