Inspired by the graceful movements of flying birds, the Snowdon Aviary was truly unique for its time; conceived by Lord Snowdon and realised by architect Cedric Price and structural engineer Frank Newby, the exhibit opened in 1965 and it was Britain's first walk-through aviary.

ZSL has partnered with renowned architects Foster + Partners to rejuvenate the pioneering model of British architecture. One of the Zoo's most famous structures, the Snowdon Aviary, celebrated its 50th anniversary in 2015 and stands proud and visible on the London skyline from Primrose Hill.

The project will enable ZSL London Zoo to transform the exhibit into a walk-through primate enclosure, allowing visitors and schoolchildren to get closer than ever before to amazing colobus monkeys.
