Transforming Stroud's canals

Thanks to a National Lottery grant of £12.7million, the Renaissance of the Cotswold Canals project has rejuvenated six miles of canal, and joined the Stroudwater Navigation to the Thames and Severn canal.

Stroud District Council, working in partnership with the Cotswolds Canal Trust, led this work with the support of enthusiastic local volunteers.

Not only is the canal now a perfect place for the local community to enjoy, it has also won approval from further afield, and the project has received three major awards.

A royal opening

The canal was officially opened by HRH Prince Charles, who boarded the narrow boat, Perseverance, for a quick trip down Wallbridge Lower Lock during his visit.

David Hagg, Stroud District Council's Chief Executive, said: "We are delighted that Prince Charles has agreed to mark this historic event.

"His visit was perfectly timed to mark the completion of the first major phase of the canal restoration project and the rejoining of two canals – the Stroudwater Navigation and the Thames & Severn."
