<b>Sharing Heritage/Our Heritage/Young Roots/First WW</b>				
1.	To Bewick and Back- From Cherryburn into History	This project promotes and interprets the heritage of Thomas Bewick. The project will use walking through the landscape to generate greater understanding of Bewick's work and natural heritage. Four free guided walks will take participants on a journey from Bewick's House in Gateshead, to his birthplace in Cherryburn and back via his workshops in Newcastle. Outputs include; facsimile wood engravings, a high profile public talk about Bewick's life, woodblock printing workshop at Cherryburn (led by National Trust), artistic responses to the walking participant's recordings and at least two exhibitions. 2.	Skelton Community Orchard	This project will develop and make accessible an overgrown area of land which once housed allotments in the centre of Skelton. An orchard will be restored along with a wildflower meadow and a bug hotel. Tees Valley Wildlife Trust will identify the species of fruit trees which are still on the site and provide training to local school children and friends group on the planting of additional species and how to maintain them. The history of the site will be researched and an interpretation board will be installed.	Skelton Villages Civic Pride	Reject
3.	Conservation and restoration of antique altar frontals and heritage	This 12th century church is located in Morpeth, Northumberland and is part of the HLF funded 'Spirit in Stone' project. This project will carry out conservation work on two altar frontals and engage local primary schoolchildren in its heritage. Talks about the restoration will be offered to visiting groups such as the WI and Mothers Union. A local embroidery specialist will give a talk to the children about the conservation of antique textiles. Each child will create an embroidery square which will be incorporated into one banner commemorating the centenary of the First World War.	St Mary Magdalene Church, Whalton	Reject
4.	Establishing Epiacum	Epiacum Heritage Ltd has been set up to promote and manage Epiacum Roman Fort with the intention of sharing the site with the general public, and to provide education and volunteering opportunities. There are four board members and no paid staff. An options appraisal will be commissioned to assess the potential uses of the site and to identify the best options to take forward in the short, medium and longer term. A structural survey will be carried out on a disused agricultural building called Holy Mire to explore its potential use. A market research study will help inform audience development and to establish the potential impact on local regeneration and tourism.	Epiacum Heritage Ltd	Award Grant of £10,000 (100%)

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5.	OUR ROOTS, OUR JOURNEY, OUR CITY	This project tells the story of the Bangladeshi community's 40 year history in Sunderland. 20 volunteers and 20 Bangladeshi elders will form the project's core participant group and will receive training in oral history and sound recording. 60+ interviews will be recorded with Bangladeshi elders who migrated to Sunderland since the 1970's; covering issues such as language, culture, family, religion and settlement. Oral histories will then be transcribed. The project will be promoted within schools to celebrate identity, diversity and understanding	Sunderland Bangladeshi Community Centre	Reject
6.	What We Did	This project will see young people from Middlesbrough exploring the leisure and social activities of young people in the early 1960's, and the heritage and cultural traditions associated with them. There will be a delivery of workshops for the young people to meet with an oral historian, researcher and film tutor to plan the research sessions. Oral history interviews will be carried out with members of the local community. From the research, oral history interviews and multi-media materials the young people will film, edit and produce a documentary to interpret and share the heritage. 7.	Dyke House remembers	The Wharton Trust, also known as 'the Annexe' is a community facility offering health, wellbeing and educational support to Dyke House and Jackson residents in Hartlepool. This year long project will engage residents in simple, yet potentially effective, first time engagement with activities related to the FWW. Activities to engage residents include; workshops exploring FWW themes such as culture, religion and the role of women; creative responses including costume making and a poetry day; and events such as film showings, intergenerational afternoon teas and constructing a FWW themed float for the Headland Parade	The Wharton Trust	Award Grant £6,300 (100%)
8.	The First World War and our community	This project will investigate and research the FWW experiences of men from their area who went to fight and the impact that the war had on their families and local community. Documents and artefacts such as letters, newspapers, diaries and photographs will be used as a basis for the research into a number of key themes. Supported by community volunteers, the DLI Museum and Beamish Museum, all of the children from the primary school will participate in a range of activities including FWW focused workshops at both museums, historical research, and a visit to the FWW practice trenches at Otterburn. 9.	HMS Comus: Educate and Commemorate	This project will focus on the Tyneside-built warship, HMS Comus, which was launched in December 1914 at the Swan Hunter shipyard. 34 cadets and volunteers will visit HMS Caroline in Belfast, the sister ship to HMS Comus, to assist in its restoration works. A new training boat will be purchased and launched at Swan Hunter to mark the centenary of HMS Comus' launch. It will also be used in the long term to enable young people to gain rowing qualifications. A metal memorial will be painted by cadets in dazzle camouflage and installed at the regional training centre in Blaydon	Tyne Tees Sea Cadets	Reject

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10.	Seaton Carew World War One Heritage Project	This project will explore the First World War heritage of Seaton Carew, in particular the shooting down of a zeppelin over the village. The project will build a remembrance entrance to Seaton Park which is immediately adjacent to the area where the zeppelin was shot down. Local children will produce ceramic tiles featuring FWW themed images that will then be used to decorate the inside facing elevation of the pillars. Volunteers will undertake research activity at local archives to inform the interpretation that will feature on the pillars and also to develop a schools information/resource pack	Friends of Seaton Park	Award Grant £10,000 (100%)
